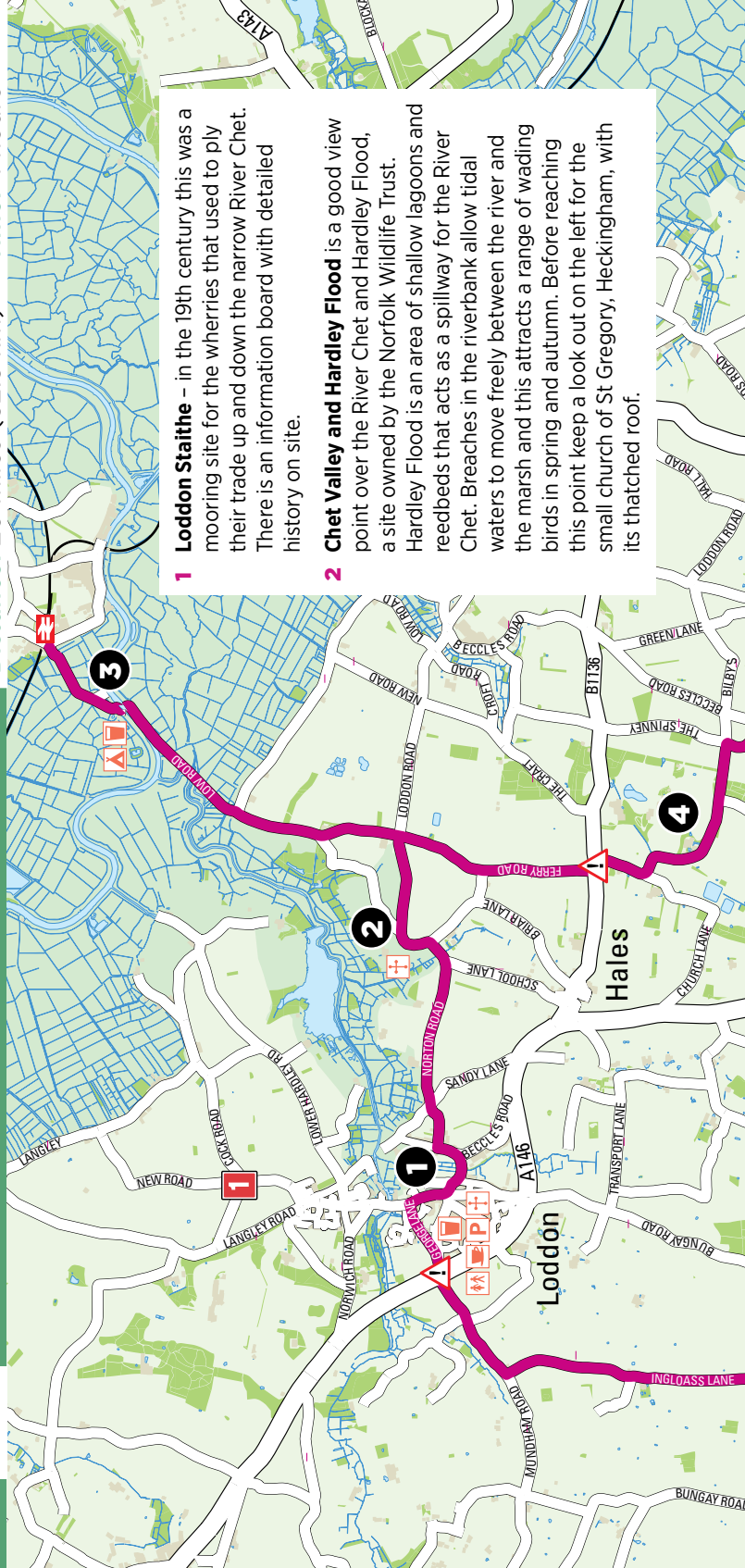
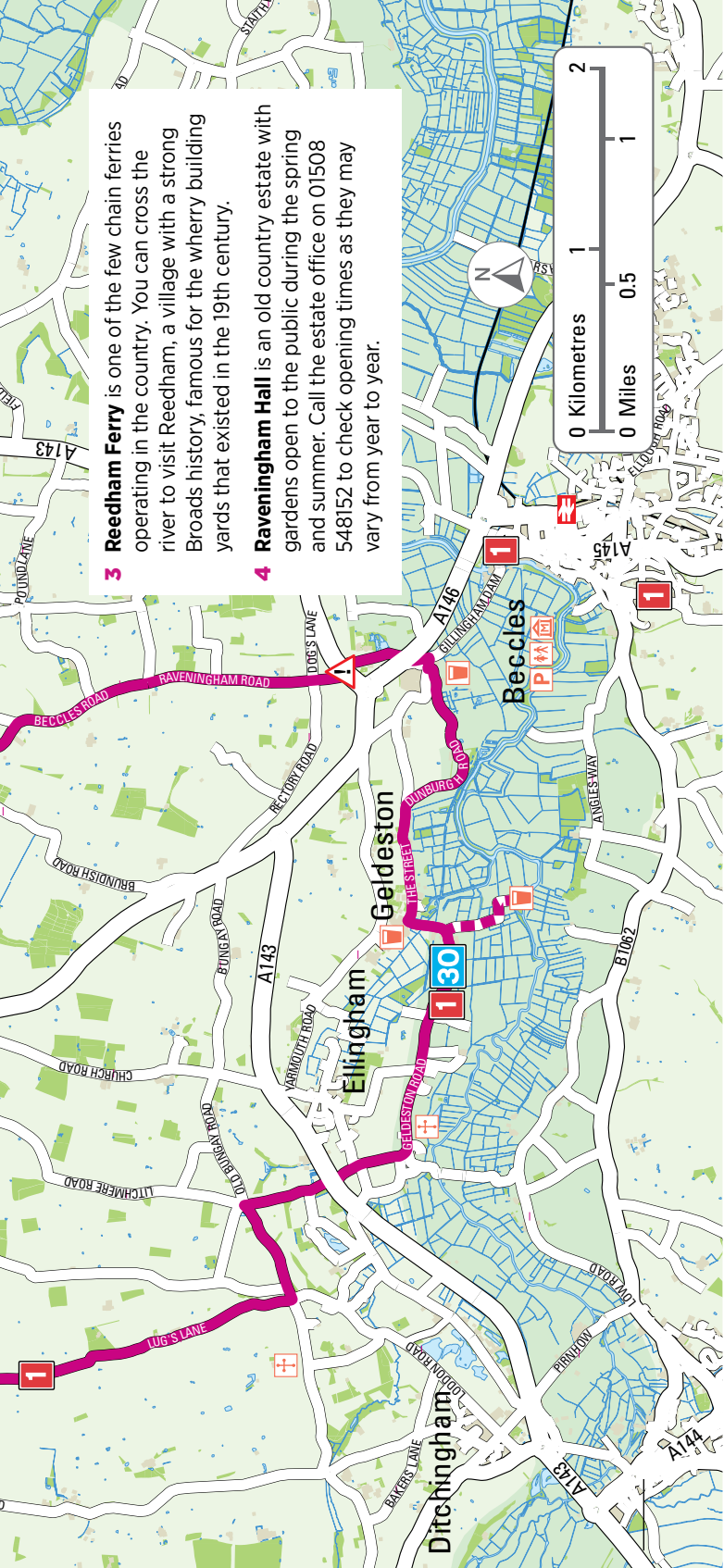


Distance: 20 miles (32.5 km) ■ Time: 4 hours



1 Loddon Staithe – in the 19th century this was a mooring site for the wherries that used to ply their trade up and down the narrow River Chet. There is an information board with detailed history on site.

2 Chet Valley and Hardley Flood is a good view point over the River Chet and Hardley Flood, a site owned by the Norfolk Wildlife Trust. Hardley Flood is an area of shallow lagoons and reedbeds that acts as a spillway for the River Chet. Breaches in the riverbank allow tidal waters to move freely between the river and the marsh and this attracts a range of wading birds in spring and autumn. Before reaching this point keep a look out on the left for the small church of St Gregory, Heckingham, with its thatched roof.



3 Reedham Ferry is one of the few chain ferries operating in the country. You can cross the river to visit Reedham, a village with a strong Broads history, famous for the wherry building yards that existed in the 19th century.

4 Raveningham Hall is an old country estate with gardens open to the public during the spring and summer. Call the estate office on 01508 548152 to check opening times as they may vary from year to year.



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
